## Chair and CEO's Message

Hard work and commitment by scores of individuals and organisations has seen the Live4Life model strengthen in the two pilot communities of Benalla and Glenelg and in the Macedon Ranges.

Live4Life has a long term change agenda and it is inspiring to see so many people and organisations understanding the importance of this work and actually getting involved and helping to increase young people's and the wider community knowledge of mental health, encourage positive help-seeking behaviours, decrease stigma and ultimately reduce suicide. In September this year the Australian Bureau of Statistics released the Causes of Death data for 2018 which includes the number of Australians who we have sadly lost to suicide. In 2018, 3,046 Australians died by suicide. This equates to more than 8 people per day. Suicide remains the leading cause of death of young people (aged 15 to 24) and now represents 40% of all deaths in this age group. This has increased from 33.3% two years ago. And the suicide rate in rural communities is 41% higher than in metropolitan areas. These figures underline the importance of our work.

In September 2018, Youth Live4Life Inc. was awarded the Innovative Youth Project or Programs in Rural or Regional Victoria Award at the Youth Affairs Council of Victoria's Rural Youth Awards. Then in December Youth Live4Life together with the Live4Life communities of Macedon Ranges Shire, Benalla Rural City and Glenelg Shire won Vic Health's Improving Mental Health Wellbeing Award.

In February 2018 we received the Interim Report from Ludowyk Evaluation's two-year evaluation of Live4Life in Benalla and Glenelg for the Victorian Government. The evaluators have identified early signs of success of Live4Life in both the pilot communities. Most importantly, the evaluators found that all communities and partnership organisations are fully committed to Live4Life and are already seeing the positive impact the model is having on the whole community. We look forward to receiving the final report in February 2020.

We were also delighted to see that the Victorian Government put its confidence in both the Live4Life model and Youth Live4Life as an organisation and supported our funding request to continue our work in Benalla and Glenelg for 12 months.

Annual Reports often concentrate on numbers and those numbers often just have dollar signs in front of them. **The numbers we like to concentrate on** are the numbers of young people, parents, teachers, brothers, sisters, coaches, volunteers and others that have received mental health first aid training. The number of young people that have given up their time to become Live4Life Crew members. The number of people that have offered to undertake mental health first aid instructor training so they can be a part of Live4Life and deliver training in their community. The number of schools, health and community organisations that have joined the

Live4Life Partnership Group within their community. These are the numbers we concentrate on.

In the last year over the three Live4Life communities 1,635 young people received training in teen Mental Health First Aid. 169 adults have been trained in Youth Mental Health First Aid, and 86 young people volunteered to be a member of the Live4Life Crew in their local community. There are now 17 teen and Youth Mental Health First Aid Instructors across the Live4Life communities delivering Mental Health First Aid training in their communities.

In October with the assistance of a grant from the Commonwealth Bank we hosted the first Crew camp at Anglesea. Which saw 34 young people aged between 14 and 16 years from Benalla, Glenelg and the Macedon Ranges Shire along with 10 support workers attend the camp. Crew members participated in workshops around 'smashing the stigma' on mental health, public speaking, marketing and promotion. They also heard from young people with lived experience of mental health and a young person who received mental health education through Live4Life in year 8 and how it supported her to seek out help. The camp built powerful bonds between the different Crews and strengthened the existing relationships within the Crews and staff. The Crew camp will become a bi-annual event.

## As an organisation the Board recognised the need to continue to build our capacity and strengthen our governance.

This year we were pleased to appoint Bernard Galbally as our inaugural CEO. Robyn Hunter, CEO of Mind Australia joined our Board. We have worked with Arnold Bloch Leibler and Brendan Case from Case Governance to develop a constitution and begin the process of transitioning to a Company Limited by Guarantee. We are very excited that Brendan will be joining us as Company Secretary in due course.

Our governance has also been strengthened with the establishment of the Finance, Audit and Risk Management Committee and the Communication and Marketing Committee. We welcome and thank Andrew Wilson-Annan, Jess Kendall from Essential Media and Stuart Shephard from Redhanded for joining these committees and providing expert advice. Next year will see the establishment of the Revenue Sourcing (Fundraising) Committee and the Program Lifecycle Committee.

At the end of 2018 we were successful in securing a Capacity Building Grant from Social Venture Partners Victoria (SVP). This is a three-year grant which will see both the Board and CEO work with SVP over the next three years to help strengthen our governance, develop a new strategic plan and investigate various organisational growth scenarios as we scale up.

This year saw the development of new revenue generating initiatives that will help contribute to the financial sustainability of the organisation as we grow our reach. These initiatives included the development

of merchandise and an on-line store, Friends4Life – a corporate giving initiative, Lap4Life – SWIM 2866, a continuous swim event that was developed by father and daughter team Sean and Kirsten McKinney, the Arnold Bloch Leibler Live4Life Lunch and the Inaugural Live4Life Spring Dinner that featured Jimmy Barnes, Dan Sultan and was hosted by Brian Nankervis. These initiatives help promote Live4Life, strengthens our relationship with communities and generate much needed revenue for Youth Live4Life.

We continue to develop our marketing and communication strategy. This year saw Live4Life posters printed and distributed for each Live4Life community based on the 2019 themes developed by each Live4Life Crew. We also produced a five-minute video on Live4Life and increased our social media presence. The video has already proved to be a very useful tool when meeting with potential new communities, funders and other stakeholders.

In 2018 the Andrews Labor Government announced a Royal Commission into the Mental Health Sector. We made a submission to the Royal Commission advocating the need to look specifically at the needs of rural communities as they differ from those of both regional and metropolitan communities. We highlighted the limited resources and support services in rural communities and the need for education and preventative strategies to support and build capacity within these communities. We are pleased to say that several submissions referenced the positive impact that

Live4Life is having in the current Live4Life communities. We will continue to monitor and, where possible, make further submissions to the Royal Commission.

We continue to work with all levels of government and this year we were asked to undertake a scoping report for Regional Development Victoria's Loddon and Campaspe Partnership Group on the interest in, and suggested road map for, the delivery of Live4Life through the whole Loddon Campaspe area which comprises of six local government areas including Macedon Ranges. As a result of that report, Live4Life is now identified as a high priority for the Loddon Campaspe Partnership Group and Regional Development Victoria will be advocating to fund the roll out of the Live4Life model via an Expression of Interest across the Loddon Campaspe region over a six-year period at \$1,943,500 for Youth Live4Life in the 2020 – 2021 State budget.

To date 23 of the 48 rural and regional local government areas have approached us to discuss working with us to implement Live4Life. This means that 48% of Victorian rural and regional local government areas are either currently embedding, implementing or interested in activating Live4Life. Over the course of the year we have worked with several communities to help them prepare for the implementation of Live4Life. As a result of this work Southern Grampians and Moira shires will begin implementing Live4Life in 2020.

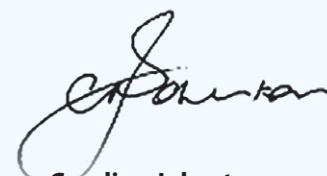
### Going Concern

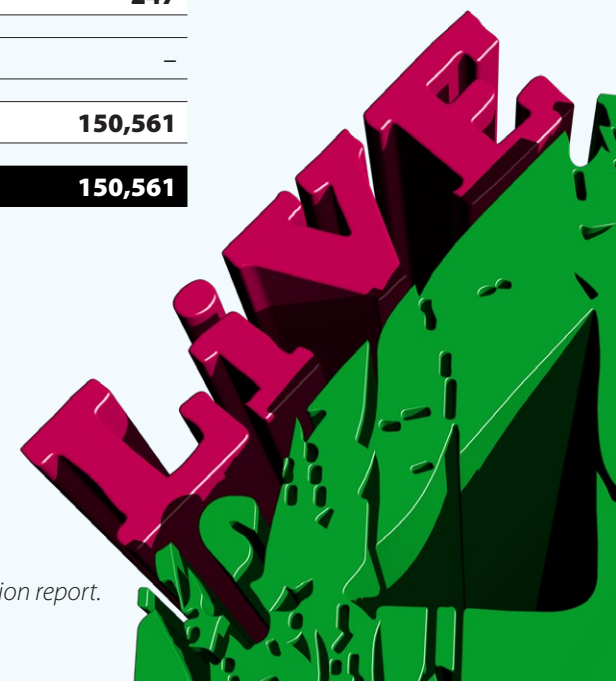

## Notes to the Financial Statements

### 1 Summary of Significant Accounting Policies

The financial statements are special purpose financial statements prepared in order to satisfy the financial reporting requirements of the Associations Incorporation Act Vic. The committee has determined that the association is not a reporting entity.

The financial statements have been prepared on an accruals basis and are based on historic costs and do not take into account changing money values or, except where stated specifically, current valuations of non-current assets.

The following significant accounting policies, which are consistent with the previous period unless stated otherwise, have been adopted in the preparation of these financial statements.

#### Income Tax

The entity is Income tax exempt.

#### Employee Provisions

Provision is made for the association's liability for employee benefits arising from services rendered by employees to the end of the reporting period. Employee provisions have been measured at the amounts expected to be paid when the liability is settled.

#### Provisions

Provisions are recognised when the association has a legal or constructive obligation, as a result of past events, for which it is probable that an outflow of economic benefits will result and that outflow can be reliably measured. Provisions are measured at the best estimate of the amounts required to settle the obligation at the end of the reporting period.

#### Cash on Hand

Cash on hand includes cash on hand, deposits held at call with banks, and other short-term highly liquid investments with original maturities of three months or less.

#### Accounts Receivable and Other Debtors

Accounts receivable and other debtors include amounts due from members as well as amounts receivable from donors. Receivables expected to be collected within 12 months of the end of the reporting period are classified as current assets. All other receivables are classified as non-current assets.

#### Revenue and Other Income

Revenue is measured at the fair value of the consideration received or receivable after taking into account any trade discounts and volume rebates allowed. For this purpose, deferred consideration is not discounted to present values when recognising revenue.

Interest revenue is recognised using the effective interest method, which for floating rate financial assets is the rate inherent in the instrument. Dividend revenue is recognised when the right to receive a dividend has been established.

Grant and donation income is recognised when the entity obtains control over the funds, which is generally at the time of receipt.

If conditions are attached to the grant that must be satisfied before the association is eligible to receive the contribution, recognition of the grant as revenue will be deferred until those conditions are satisfied.

All revenue is stated net of the amount of goods and services tax.

#### Goods and Services Tax (GST)

Revenues, expenses and assets are recognised net of the amount of GST, except where the amount of GST incurred is not recoverable from the Australian Taxation Office (ATO). Receivables and payables are stated inclusive of the amount of GST recoverable from, or payable to, the ATO is included with other receivables or payables in the assets and liabilities statement.

#### Accounts Payable and Other Payables

Accounts payable and other payables represent the liability outstanding at the end of the reporting period for goods and services received by the association during the reporting period that remain unpaid. The balance is recognised as a current liability with the amounts normally paid within 30 days of recognition of the liability.

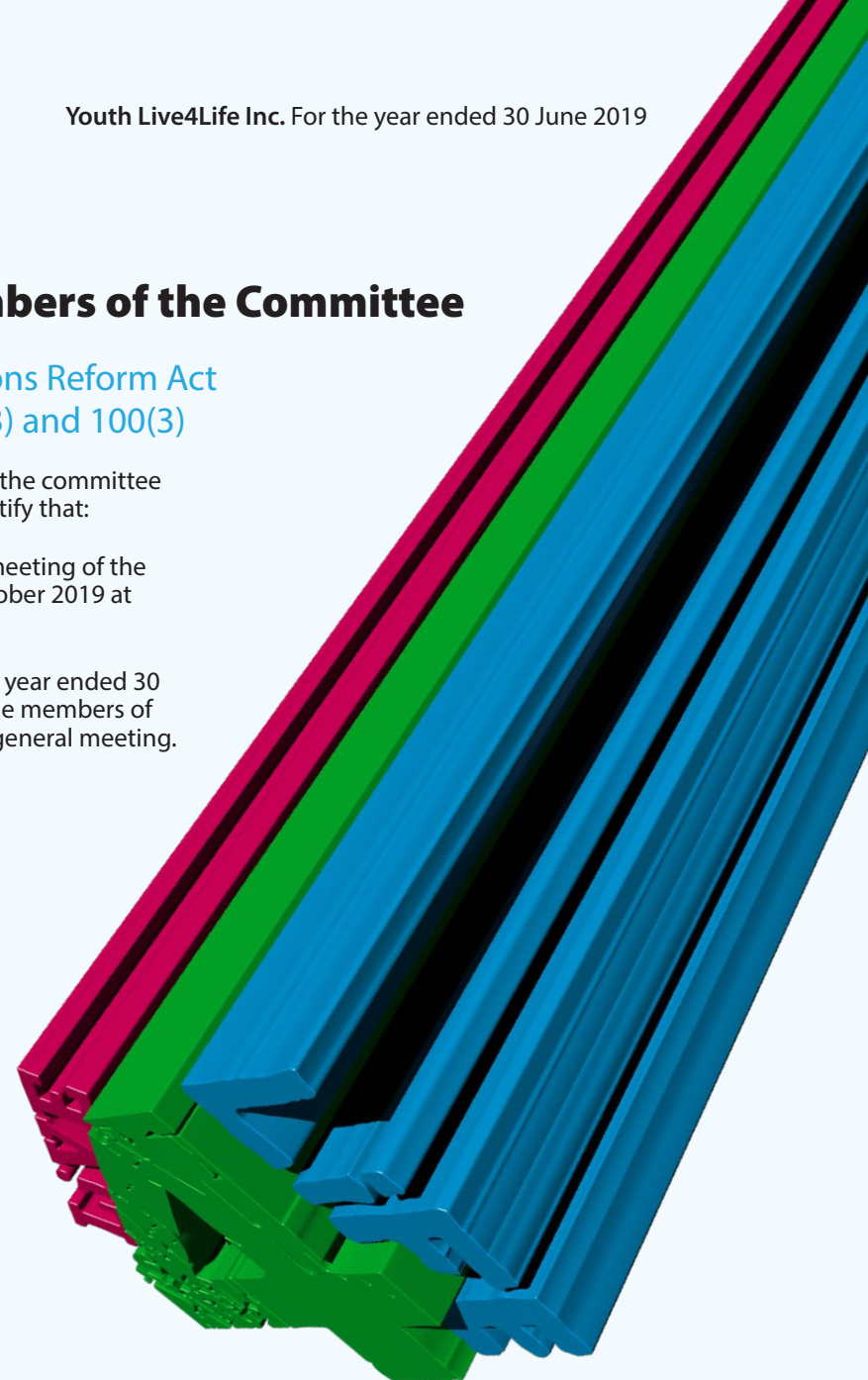

## Compilation report to Youth Live4Life Inc

We have compiled the accompanying special purpose financial statements of Youth Live4Life Inc., which comprise the asset and liabilities statement as at 30 June 2019, income and expenditure statement, the statement of cash flows, a summary of significant accounting policies and other explanatory notes. The specific purpose for which the special purpose financial statements have been prepared is set out in Note 1.

### The Responsibility of the Committee Member's

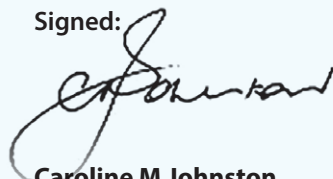
